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School Description

The culture of Whitehead Elementary School reflects a commitment that all students can learn and encourages all students to be academically successful. Efforts are ongoing to maintain a school wide focus on a high-level standards-based education. The staff and parents work together to create a positive learning environment and to improve student achievement. Continuous improvement and Growth Mindset enhance the learning environment. Students are recognized for citizenship, responsibility, academic achievement, attendance and Character Traits. Beginning with the 2019-2020 school year, Whitehead Elementary developed and implemented a new STEM program school-wide. The Whitehead Elementary staff, teachers, parents, students, ELAC and Booster Club will continue to communicate clearly and work effectively to enable our students to meet standards and to achieve our school wide site plan goals and objectives.

Community and District Profile

Woodland is located in Yolo County and has a rich heritage of community spirit and neighborly charm. With a population of more than 56,000 people, the town is situated twenty miles from downtown Sacramento and 85 miles from San Francisco. Woodland Joint Unified School District includes seven preschools, eleven elementary schools, one charter elementary school, two middle schools, two comprehensive senior high schools, a continuation high school, and an adult school, and served approximately 9,782 students in the 2018-2019 school year.

Whitehead Elementary School operates on a traditional calendar. For the 2018-2019 school year, Whitehead had 411 students enrolled in Transitional Kindergarten through sixth-grade.

About the SARC

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

Whitehead Elementary School, originally constructed in the 1970's, offers a safe and secure campus for students, staff, and visitors. The school is currently comprised of 24 classrooms, including portables and a preschool, one library, one multipurpose room, one staff room, two playgrounds, and an Even Start program. Facility information is current as of November 20, 2019.

Cleaning Process

The Principal works daily with the custodial staff to ensure regular and continual maintenance of the school's physical environment.

Maintenance and Repair

District maintenance staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and highest priority to emergency repairs. At time of publication 100% of restrooms on campus were in working order.

The school district benefits from extensive support from parents and community members. Whitehead Elementary School is proud of its many opportunities for parents to volunteer their time. These opportunities include classroom and project volunteers, field trip chaperones, fundraising, English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC), Booster Club, and School Site Council (SSC). Whitehead values parent involvement and welcomes parents as part of our learning community.

We are working hard to increase parent participation at Whitehead. We are increasing participation by having multiple assemblies each month, that include parents, celebrating student success. We have also taught parents how to change the language button on the Aeries screen so that all material is available in their home language. There is an interpreter at all school meetings for our Spanish speaking parents. By moving to a Booster Club with no membership dues, we are aiming to see increased parent participation, both during and outside of the school day.

School Safety Plan

Safety of students is a priority of the school staff. Students are supervised throughout the day by teachers and certified noon duty supervisors. There is a designated area for student drop-off and pick-up at the school. Visitors to the school must check in at the office and wear a visitor's badge while on campus.

Whitehead Elementary School's Site Safety Plan is revised annually by the School Site Council, which consists of administrators, teachers, classified staff, and parents/community members. Key elements of the Safety Plan include student safety, conflict resolution strategies, and emergency preparedness.

The school is in compliance with all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and State earthquake standards. Emergency drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year, including monthly fire evacuations, quarterly earthquake drills and biannual intruder drills. In the event of an emergency, the school's Disaster Preparedness Plan has clearly defined procedures to accommodate crisis situations, and emergency supplies are available. The safety plan is reviewed annually with staff and by the School Site Council.

Woodland Joint Unified School District provides time and resources for collaboration, planning, and professional development for all staff. Teachers at each school receive training directly related to curriculum and instruction by attending workshops and conferences that are approved by the district and administration. Staff development days enable staff members to deliver curriculum and instruction that is rigorous, challenging, and responsive to student needs. The development of a common district-wide instructional focus is allowing entry point for everyone to learn and stretch their practice. The focus of professional development has shifted to provide job-embedded coaching across multiple content areas to build capacity and focus on strengthening application of instructional strategies.

Woodland Joint Unified School District uses a variety of professional learning models to engage staff in their continued growth. During the school year and summer, staff have opportunities to complete professional development learning episodes and time to implement best practices learned. The professional growth occurring in Woodland Joint Unified School District has a heavy emphasis on collaboration with time reserved weekly for staff collaboration by sites in grade level or departmental teams under the direction of site administrators.
